## DISCUSSION QUESTIONS & STUDY:

- 1. Why did Uzziah's death affect Isaiah so deeply? How as the death of a national leader affected you or what have you observed of its effect on a nation?
- 2. How does God's sovereignty over the universe give us confidence, even in time of political, economical, societal instability (like when godly King Uzziah died)?
- 3. What is the significance of the fact that the seraphim are sinless yet they still covered their faces before Jesus?
- 4. What does *holy* mean? Why do the seraphim say it three times? Why would you say that holiness is the most important attribute of God for us sinners to embrace?
- 5. What effect did this awesome heavenly scene have on Isaiah? How should a proper contemplation of the holiness of the Lord result in a humble awareness of our sinfulness? Why is such an ongoing awareness both reasonable and necessary to our full and final salvation from sin?
- 6. How is your experience of God like Isaiah's: Awestruck? Guilt-ridden? Cleansed? Are you willing to serve anywhere, anytime?
- 7. Which attributes of God most impress/ed you?
- 8. Why was Isaiah's message rejected?
- 9. How does Isaiah's day compare to our own?
- 10. Do you find the message of vv. 9-10 difficult to swallow? How can we understand the intentions of God in purposefully hardening hearts and blinding eyes against spiritual truth? How does that message related to Christ's use of parables and the explanation for why the Jews could not believe in Jesus despite his miracles (Jn 12:39-41)? How does it related to Romans 9:18?
